A Letter from Our Priest-In-Charge

Dear People of God at St. Luke's,

It seems that this will be my last letter to you so I will use it to say good-by.

To tell you the truth, I don't really want to say good-by but that is the nature of Interim Ministry. I'm not sure I can fully express to you what serving St. Luke's has meant to me. By your acceptance of my ministry, you have restored my faith in myself as a priest as I move finally to retire. Aside from laughing at my corny jokes, you have been instrumental in the deepening of my own spirituality. Your willingness to actively engage in study, of both Scripture and of the books we used for our Advent and Lenten studies, has been inspiring to me and has made me want to go even deeper.

Although it is important that clergy not seek approval of our sermons, your appreciation of the work I do to prepare the sermons has inspired me to work even more and read even more. Many of you have expressed doubts about the whole God thing, yet you still come back, and you still continue to read Scripture and study. One of the things I have come to realize more fully is that it is possible to hold faith and doubt together. We have struggled together on this but I believe God is there in our struggle.

I am 76 and I am here to tell you that one can never stop learning about God and life. I think that is something this community can offer to the larger community, a spirituality for the latter part of life. It is never too late!

I know if I try to thank all of you who have been important to me I will leave someone out, but there are two people I particularly want to thank for their ministry to St. Luke's, and also to me. These are Lisa Lindsay and Corey Walmer. When I first arrived, Lisa was very helpful in filling me in on all the ins and outs of St. Luke's. We have had some great conversations, sometimes about the church, and I will miss that.

Your Deacon, Corey, has also been of great help. As you know, she selects the hymns and writes the Prayers of the People. Although I have veto power on the hymns, I very seldom felt the need to exercise it. Corey considers this part of her ministry and I am grateful to her for her willingness to do this as it relieved me of a very time consuming job. We, too, have had some great conversations and I have enjoyed working with her as a colleague.

There seemed so much more I wanted to say, but you know how it is. Eloquence in the wee hours of the morning escapes us in the light of day. So I will just tell you how much I have loved being your priest and pastor. You will always be in my heart and my prayers. May God bless you on your continued journey with God.



I am constantly grateful for this work. I always feel loved and appreciated and like I can give a little back. Thank you! See you in church.


