A Letter from Our Rector



Advent-a time of anticipation.

When you are reading this newsletter, we will be in the season of Advent. Most people know that there are four weeks ending with Christmas Day.

A popular tradition to do with the four Sundays is the Advent Wreath. We light one in church each week before the service,

and some families have one at home. Lighting an Advent wreath is a wonderful way to focus on the real reason for Christmas Day.

To make the weekly lighting of the wreath more meaningful, here is a schedule of Scripture for each candle and what it represents.

Week 1: Read Matthew 3:1-2; light a purple candle (representing prophecy) and have family prayer time. Discuss expectations and hopes for the future.

Week 2: Read Matthew 2:1-6; light a purple candle (representing the shepherds) and have family prayer. Discuss anticipation and preparation for Christmas.

Week 3: Read Luke 2:8-12; light a rose- colored candle (representing the angels) and have family prayer. Discuss our joys in life.

Week 4: Read Matthew 2:7-11; light a purple candle (representing the Magi) and have family prayer. Discuss good gifts from God.

Christmas Day: Read John 8:12; light the white Christ candle (in the middle of the wreath) and give thanks for Jesus, the Light of the World.

Grant, Almighty God, that looking forward in faith to the feast of our Lord's birth, we may feel all the happiness our Savior brings, and celebrate His coming with unfailing joy.

We had a fulfilling time at our retreat with the candidates in October and will welcome them back in January for their walkabouts in Portland, Augusta, and Bangor. The election will be in Bangor at the Cross Center on February 9th. 
Christmas Eve Nativity Play




HANNAFORD GIFT CARDS FOR THE HOLIDAYS! 🦃
