A Letter from Our Rector



Be Content

A couple of weeks ago I was on the phone with a clergy friend of mine who has been through some very serious struggles these last few years. Between illness, relationship breakups, and church life in general, it is amazing that she still has a wonderful attitude on life. When I asked how she keeps this attitude when all is falling down

around her, she replied, "Look in Philippians 4:11-13. Paul tells us about contentment. This is what I use every day and I don't know what I would do without his words."

Opening my Bible, I found the words, "In am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. I can do everything through him who gives me strength." (emphasis mine). In his letter to Philippi, Paul appreciates the gifts they have given him, but not to be dependent on the people of that city. His source of contentment, no matter what the circumstances, comes from God. Paul understands that to rely on others for his happiness is futile because we are not perfect and will eventually fail. The best way to handle life and its ups and downs is to look to God, who is perfect and will never fail to give us strength.

The word content is not to be confused with the word complacent. To be content is to be satisfied and at ease, while complacent is self-satisfaction. This is the

secret to being content no matter what life throws at us is to live in union with Christ and not look to ourselves for contentment.

So let us learn to be content in any and every situation and draw on the strength to be content that is ours through Jesus Christ.



- *In addition to donations, we need kitchen angels (to supply the upstairs with cold and hot


cider), two people to serve cider, and two or three to hand out candy.
